In the New Orleans jazz funeral tradition, "Just A Closer Walk with Thee" is often performed as a slow dirge by dozens of brass players and marching percussionists as the casket of the deceased is taken from the church to the cemetery. After the burial, the musicians and the family lead a street parade with upbeat celebratory music. The procession is followed by the "second line," which includes mourners and anyone else who joins in to dance and move along with the assembly.

Mary Lou Williams (1910-1981) is one of the great pianists, composers, and arrangers in the history of jazz. Williams wrote and arranged for such

bandleaders as Duke Ellington and Benny Goodman, and she was friend, mentor, and teacher to Thelonious Monk, Charlie Parker, Miles Davis, Tadd Dameron, Dizzy Gillespie, and many others. Through the 1960s she wrote extensive liturgical and sacred music including Mary Lou's Mass. "Offertory" is a work that she played both in worship, recital, and jazz festival settings.

Guide My Feet

"Guide My Feet" is an African-American Spiritual (also called Negro Spiritual). This arrangement cross-pollinates the Spiritual tradition with the New Orleans Second Line tradition.

Spirituals are a type of religious folk song sung by enslaved Africans and their descendants which proliferated in the 1770s-1860s. The form has its roots in the clandestine and informal gatherings of enslaved Africans in "praise houses" and outdoor meetings called "brush arbor meetings," "bush meetings," or "camp meetings" in the eighteenth century. At the meetings, participants would sing, chant, dance and sometimes enter ecstatic trances... Enslaved people were fascinated by biblical stories containing parallels to their own lives and created spirituals that retold narratives about biblical figures like Daniel and Moses. As Africanized Christianity emerged, spirituals served as a way to express the community's faith, as well as its sorrows and hopes.
